From the Pastor:

Dear Friends,

Over the past several weeks the Sunday morning scripture texts have been stories of Jesus at table. When Jesus was at table he was frequently criticized for eating and drinking with sinners. It was while he was at table that he told stories about a lost sheep, a lost coin, about a father with two sons. He was at the table when a woman came, upsetting polite company by bathing his feet with her tears and wiping them with her hair. He was at the table when he noticed guests choosing places of honor, so he told a story about giving a dinner party and inviting the poor, the lame, the blind. He was at the table on the night he was betrayed when he shared the Passover meal with his disciples, and gave them bread, saying, "This is my body," and wine, saying, "This is my blood." And he was at the table with two disciples after his resurrection, when he took bread, and blessed and broke it and gave it to them and their eyes were opened and they recognized him.

So much of Jesus' teaching and ministry took place when people were gathered around a table to share a meal.

The practice continued among the first followers of Jesus: They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved (Acts 2: 42-47).

Table fellowship was an essential characteristic of this new and growing community of Jesus' followers. Their table fellowship involved more than just eating together but it was at least that.

I've been thinking about how we can encourage that practice in our own congregation. I know of one church where a group of people from the congregation meet once a month to cook and share a meal together. They always prepare more than they need and set aside the left overs so they can be bought later to those who have recently returned home from the hospital, or to others in the congregation who need to be remembered. The Third Reformed Church in Albany prepares and serves a monthly community dinner for people in the neighborhood. Perhaps we could plan for small groups in our congregation to meet together in homes for food and fellowship. Good things happen around the table.

Jesus often gathered around the table with friends and strangers alike. I think we can, too. How shall we do that?


The Way: Walking Together on the Journey of Faith

Luke offers this description of the first followers of Jesus: "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42). Meeting in smaller groups, often over a shared meal, and talking and praying together about the life of faith was a central practice of the early Christian community.

At First Church *The Way* is an opportunity to explore the life of faith. Through prayerful reading of scripture and thoughtful questions and discussion we make space to listen for what God is saying and where God might be leading us today. *The Way* is an opportunity for your faith to be explored, nurtured, and renewed, your commitment to Jesus Christ affirmed, and your walk as a disciple of Christ to be strengthened. *The Way* is especially for those new to First Church and for those who are interested in further exploring the Christian faith.

Another *The Way* group will be forming later this month. If you have a friend or neighbor who is not already involved in a faith community, consider inviting them to come along on *The Way*. Offer to come with them. We meet after Sunday worship in the church parlor for a light lunch and then meet for 30-45 minutes in small groups for reflection and discussion of the scripture text for the day.

Bring your dishes Sunday after church, weekdays between 9 am and 1:00 pm or Thursday night between 6:30 and 7:30. Soft foods and foods that are easy to chew are appreciated. Also some guests do not eat pork products so if your dish contains pork please label if "Contains Pork."

Sponsored by the Capital Area Council of Churches, the Overflow Shelter provides food and shelter each night to about 20 men: the working poor who can't afford regular housing, those with mental health or addiction issues that make them ineligible for other shelters, and some just down on their luck in hard times. It is "shelter of last resort" turning nobody away.

Growing Green

Making things greener

This is part of an ongoing series on how we can "grow green." Each month we share a few tips on simple practices that may increase our stewardship of God's good earth.

- For a greener spring cleaning use vinegar and baking soda instead of bleach.
- Use a toaster oven or microwave instead of a regular oven.
- Grow a pot of lettuce or a collection of herbs in your window; or plant early vegetables.
- The nice weather is coming! Get out side, take a walk or bike ride.

You may be affected by the Northeast Direct Pipeline

One of our sister congregations, the First Reformed Church of Bethlehem in Selkirk, is calling attention to the proposed Northeast Direct (NED) Pipeline. If constructed as planned, the pipeline would cut a huge swath through some of the church's forested land, land that was bought in 1795 from Stephen Van Rensselaer, one of the early Dutch patroons, and which is on the National Historic Registry. The proposed pipeline, which would carry gas extracted by fracking and would run from Pennsylvania through New York State and Massachusetts, also raises a number of environmental and health concerns. First Church to Host Habitat Workers

For the next several weeks First Church has the opportunity to host a group of college-age students who will be working on nearby Habitat for Humanity projects on Sheridan Avenue, Orange Street, and Clinton Avenue. From mid-April through the first week in June we will be providing sleeping and living space for eight to twelve young adults. They will also be using the church kitchen and Zimmerman Hall for breakfasts and dinners. These young adults are participating in the AmeriCorps NCCC (National Civilian Community Corps) program in partnership with Habitat for Humanity. They may also join us in worship from time to time and help out with projects around the church. We thank them for their service to our community and are glad to be able to provide some First Church hospitality.

Purchase Fair Trade Extra Virgin Olive Oil and Soap

Support the farmers of Palestine in the struggle for their livelihood and land.



Olives are an important crop for the people of Palestine. Purchasing olive oil and olive oil products through Palestinian cooperatives directly benefits families living in occupied Palestine. It is also a way of letting them know that they have not been forgotten in their hope for end to the illegal Israeli occupation and military rule.

Farmers are paid free trade prices through the Palestine Fair Trade Association. 750 ml bottles of olive oil from Zatoun (*Zatoun* is the Arabic word for olive) are \$20. 500 ml bottles from Canaan Fair Trade are \$18. Small bars of olive oil soap are \$4 each. Please call the church office or contact John Paarlberg if you would like to purchase some for yourself or as gifts for others.
