## FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

*He is not here. He is risen!*

With these words the season of Eastertide – a season of holy surprise and discovery – begins.

Recently I read an article written by church consultant David Brubaker with the surprising title: “Want less conflict? Look out the window!” I discovered, as I reflected on our lives within and beyond the church, why it can be challenging to see out our windows: we put pieces of furniture and other obstacles in front of them. We turn our attention inside, distracted by the tasks of maintaining our households, and by familiar activities. And truth be told, seeing through is made harder when we resist the challenge of applying soap and water to the glass! It’s a worthy metaphor in the life of any church.

About church life, Brubaker made these observations: “A healthy congregation celebrates marriages, dedicates babies, and commemorates the lives of the departed. Every congregation must also attend to the administrative realities of balancing a budget, maintaining a facility, and making payroll. However, a congregation focused only on the needs of its members and the demands of its building and employees is likely a congregation in decline. To paraphrase William Temple, ‘a congregation is the only association that exists for the benefit of those who are not its members.’”

This Easter, as the weather warms and the spring air beckons, let’s make the effort to “look out the window” to see where the risen Christ has moved beyond restrictive walls to invite us to join in new life. With whom might he be conversing at the Drive-in worship? Will he sit with Cleo-o in the park, and greet those who spend time there? Will he stroll through the neighborhood around the church, reaching out with a smile and a kind word? Are we willing to follow him?

In this Easter season, do we dare to be caught unawares? Where will we find God at work? Will we brave being led into wonder and unexpected encounters?

I hope so!


## **Liturgists**

# TRANSITION UPDATE



Since our March “Family” article, the Transition Team has been diligently at work. We have taken the Core Values identified by the group which gathered on March 25 and posted them in the lobby. You might use these Core Values to lift prayers of thanksgiving to God for the ways the congregation is already living them out, and prayers for guidance on what the church yet may do.

- Community Outreach: Mission from this location
- Discipleship: What is God doing in our lives?
- Diversity: Welcome statement
- Fellowship: Congregational care and member relations
- History and Reformed Tradition: 1642-Present
- Worship: Form, preaching, music
- Youth

On March 18, we gathered in Zimmerman Hall to delve deeper into the congregation’s commitment to carry some of our dreams forward. Each of five table groups took one of the posters of dreams, where sticker dots designated individual passion for specific projects, and discussed together what they observed, and where the projects fit the core values. In different random groupings, they looked at what might be realistic based on current resources of members and attenders, and church assets. Lastly people “voted with their feet,” moving to the arena where they personally had the most passion to talk about next steps toward short- and long-term goals.

The Transition Team intends to invite young adults (20- and 30- somethings) to act as a focus group to take the ideas of Forum #2 and share/learn/dissect the information from their perspective. We hope they’ll then make some plans and investment in the church’s future!

The Transition Team has shared with Consistory their ideas about the composition of the Pastoral Search Committee. They did not identify individuals but listed desirable characteristics and skills necessary for a successful search, which Consistory approved of and added to. You are welcome to make your nominations for the search Committee now. (See insert) It is the hope that the Search Committee can be gathered and approved for presentation at the May congregational meeting.

## STAFF CHANGES

God is at work helping to reshape the staff of First Church.

- This month, we welcome a new Social Media Communications Coordinator: Betsy Gorman. In past jobs, Betsy has helped develop website clarity and user friendliness, and found ways to coordinate various modes of social media so that information goes to the public in a timely, creative way. Currently working part-time for FOCUS Churches in a similar capacity, she is delighted to learn more about the history and ministry of First Church and to work with us to communicate needed information within the church and to reach out to a wider public. She will be working on contract for five hours a week, sometimes in our building and sometimes at home. Please welcome her when you meet her!
- Beginning on May 1, the Rev. Susan Vincent Cox will cut her hours back to half-time. Sue has been moved toward this change both by her sense of the needs of the church, now a smaller congregation, and by her personal sense of call to further develop her ministry as a counsellor, spiritual director and clearness committee leader. She will continue to be in worship twice a month and to preach four times a year, to lead bible study and other small groups, to offer pastoral care and counselling, and to work closely with staff and Leadership during the transition. One of Sue's goals is to resource and empower leaders within the congregation to guide small groups and new ministries.
- Soon the Pastoral Search Committee (PSC) will be named and begin its work. Please read the article about how the Interim Time is unfolding, and if you have ideas about people who would be strong members of the PSC, please speak with them to secure their willingness to serve, and then offer their names in nomination.

## **The *NAT PHIPPS JAZZ TRIO* to play at April 8<sup>th</sup> Worship Service. Celebrate the Sunday after Easter**

We welcome back the Nat Phipps Jazz trio on April 8<sup>th</sup>, the Sunday after Easter. Those who have heard the trio before in worship know we are in for a treat. The trio is well-known through-out the Capital District and joins us in worship several times each year.

The founder of the trio, jazz pianist, Nat Phipps, is originally from Newark, New Jersey, where he spent his early years playing in New York City and New Jersey. After moving to the Capital District, he became a respected educator and sought-after jazz pianist in this area. Joining him will be drummer, Pete Sweeney, performer, clinician, author of over twenty books on drumming, and drum teacher both privately and at many local schools and colleges. Completing the trio will be Chatham bassist, Pete Toigo, performer and teacher on bass and guitar, who also serves on the faculty of several local colleges and can be heard regularly performing with a wide variety of Jazz and Pop artist and groups. ## **FOOD PANTRY**

In February, the First Church Food Pantry served 106 households, of whom six were new to us. On the seven days the pantry was open, one infant, 29 children, 89 adults under the age of 64, and 12 seniors received food. The Food Pantry is able to provide twice the number of meals required under Hunger Prevention and Nutrition Assistance Program (HPNAP) guidelines. In New York, 12% of the population is food insecure, or does not have enough money to meet basic nutritional needs.

HPNAP fills the gap for families living at or below 200% of the federal poverty level, recognizing costs of living in New York are often higher than in other states in the US.

We are grateful for our Food Pantry volunteers and for all whose gifts to First Church allow us to help our neighbors in need. If you would like to volunteer on Mondays or Wednesdays, please be in touch with the church office or with Lorraine Houk, our Food Pantry Coordinator, at the FOCUS Churches office 518-443-0460.

Our toiletries' collection for the Food Pantry this month: RAZORS, will be on Sunday, April 8<sup>th</sup>. As you are aware, the items listed for the coming months cannot be purchased with food stamps, and yet they are necessary for any household on a regular basis for good health and hygiene. Upcoming collection items are listed below. Thank you for reaching out to help your neighbors in need.


