

FROM PASTOR MASHONA'S DESK

Happy New Year!! With any new season we are called to shift. This includes a new year, a new relationship, or a new stage in life. The transition working to retirement can fill us with excitement and dread. We long for the rest while fearing that our finances may not be enough. When we shift well, our hearts are light. When we shift poorly, everyone needs to make room for the baggage that enters the room with us. Making

necessary transitions that we want and shifts that life presents can be difficult.

Joanna Weaver's book *Having a Mary Heart in a Martha World* comes to mind.



As you look ahead to a new year please consider the New Testament story of Mary and Martha. Jesus paid a visit to Martha's home. Let's stop right there. <u>Jesus</u> paid a visit to Martha's home. Like any self-respecting hostess Martha leaped into action. I'm sure there were floors to be swept, linen to wash, groceries to purchase and guests to serve. Picture Downton Abbey on steroids. Martha ran around doing what was always done when a dignitary stayed in her home. Unfortunately, the tasks did not feed Martha's soul and she became resentful. Meanwhile her sister Mary just sat at Jesus feet. How could she, when Martha was working so hard and doing so much! So, Martha asked Jesus to tell her sister to get up and help.

Instead of commending and agreeing with Martha Jesus lifts up Mary who has chosen God's presence over and above everything else. Jesus did not come to prop up a dying system that would not bring about salvation, no matter how historic. Jesus paid a visit to Martha's home to be with Martha and all who dwelled there. Yes, things need to be done, decisions need to be made but not at the expense of spending time with Jesus. We Martha's can forget that the earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof. That is like a child not spending time talking to their parent when the parent walks into the child's bedroom because the child feels they must clean and tidy the room up. Yes, the parent wants the kid to keep a clean room but not at the expense of family time.

How many wonderful hosts during this past Christmas and Advent season were so busy with hosting, they didn't spend time with their guests? I had an aunt who has now passed. During Christmas season her home was filled with grand decorations and food from out of this world. My aunt never sat down. She was always buzzing about her beautiful home as the host with the most.

Over the years I began to ask her to sit down and spend time with us. Her home was often full of family and festivities but as the years rolled by, I longed to hear her story. Who was she as a woman? What was her childhood like? From where did all these recipes come? Who taught her how to garden? Why did she know so many home remedies? My aunt eventually developed Alzheimer's and the festivities at her home ended. I treasure the times we shared. Doing was her love language. But, many of her stories died with her.

As you approach this new year, how can you cultivate a Mary heart in a Martha world? Mary had a heart for worship. Mary wanted above all else to experience and savor the presence of the Savior. How do we cultivate a Mary heart in this new year? How do we, as the deer pants by the book, allow our souls to pant for God?

At First Church there are opportunities for work and worship. You can put action with faith by commendably joining powerful ministries: food pantry, prayer shawl, and communications to name a few. At the same time, you can open your heart by faithfully attending Sunday worship and joining us every Wednesday at 12 Noon in James Chapel for Centering Prayer where we like Mary get to sit in God's presence.

How do we live with a Mary heart in a Martha world? Mary embraced the new covenant over old customs. This year as you do the work that needs to be done, I implore you to begin your reflection with this question:

• How does this tradition, philosophy or task aid in building my relationships with God, self, and others?



Caseworkers let us know the residents could use new sheets for bedding this 30 bed unit.

Kids Alive Rescues children one at a time and enrolls them in a safe home, care center or school program, provides medical help. Currently this agency is reaching children in 12 countries.

EACH MONTH WE'RE CELEBRATING AN IMPORTANT AFRICAN AMERICAN COMPOSER

January's composer is John Wesley Work, Jr. 1871-1925



- Choral director, teacher, researcher and songwriter
- First African-American collector of Negro folksongs
- Probably born August 6, 1871 in Nashville, Tennessee. His father was a church choir director in Nashville
- Student, then, later, Professor of History, Latin and Greek at all-black Fisk University
- Became interested in Slave songs and spirituals while singing in the choir at Fisk
- Together with his brother, Fredrick, became a leader in the movement to preserve, study, and perform Negro spirituals
- Collected, harmonized and published numerous collections of spirituals
- With his wife, Agnes, trained, directed and performed with professional and student groups of the *Jubilee singers* at Fisk for more than twenty-five years
- Force to resign in 1923 as "black music" became unpopular at Fisk
- Became president of Roger Williams University but died two years later
- Several of his children became famous composers in their own right
- The most famous song he collected is Go tell it on the mountain


Our choir has his collection "Folk Song of the American Negro."

Each Month we'll celebrate a different women composer. January's composer is Elizabeth Poston 24 October 1905 -18 March 1987

- English composer, pianist, and writer
- Collected folksongs and edited and published many collections
- During WW II worked as secret agent
- Worked for the British Broadcasting
- Wrote a wide variety of music including numerous scores for television and radio programs



CELEBRATING ANNIVERSARIES

Happy 150th anniversary Charles Arnould Tournemire 22 January 1870 – 3 or 4 November 1939

- Famous French organist, composer and teacher
- Was already a church organist by the age of eleven
- Organist at Basilique Ste-Clothilde, Paris which has a famous French organ by Cavaillé-Coll, the greatest organ builder of the 19th century
- Professor of Music at Paris Conservatoire
- Wrote operas, symphonies and chamber music
- Most known for his improvisations and sacred organ music rooted in the great hymns and chants of the church, especially L'Orgue Mystique (the Mystical Organ) - fifty-one sets of organ pieces for fifty-one weeks of liturgical year


