FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

At the recent meeting of the Reformed Church General Synod, General Secretary Tom DeVries pointed to the often cited surveys of millennials—those aged 18-34— that show that people in this age group are widely believed to have less faith in God and are less active in religion than their parents and grandparents. A study released by the Pew Research Center in October 2012 stated that if you are under thirty there is a one-in-three chance that religion plays little or no role in your life.

Tom then quoted Rachel Held Evans, a popular evangelical author and blogger and a millennial:

What millennials really want from the church is not a change in style but a change in substance.

We want an end to the culture wars. We want a truce between science and faith.

We want to be known for what we stand for, not what we are against.

We want to ask questions that don't have predetermined answers.

We want churches that emphasize an allegiance to the kingdom of God over an allegiance to a single political party or a single nation...

We want to be challenged to live lives of holiness, not only when it comes to sex, but also when it comes to living simply, caring for the poor and oppressed, pursuing reconciliation, engaging in creation care and becoming peacemakers.

You can't hand us a latte and then go about business as usual and expect us to stick around. We're not leaving the church because we don't find the cool factor there; we're leaving the church because we don't find Jesus there. Like every generation before ours and every generation after, deep down, we long for Jesus.

I am not a millennial and there are few millennials in our congregation, yet when I read those words, I think, “Yes—that’s what I want too; that’s what the people in my congregation are looking for also.” When I look out over the congregation on a Sunday morning I see people, whether millennial or octogenarian, who asking good questions, seeking substance more than style, who are living lives of holiness by serving neighbors in need, reading to students at Arbor Hill School, walking along side those in the latter stages of life, teaching children the stories of Jesus, learning how to bridge differences and communicate with compassion, and reflecting the love of Christ in countless other ways. First Church may be decidedly lacking in the “cool factor,” but I see many people who are looking for—and finding and serving Jesus.

Reading to Students at Arbor Hill Elementary School

Earlier this year we invited the principal of Arbor Hill, Ms. Rosalind Gaines-Harrell, to come visit us here at First Church and to talk with us about how we might as neighbors build a closer relationship together. We asked if there was anything we could do to help her, knowing resources can be limited in schools. She responded quickly and enthusiastically with, "Wow, if you could come and read to some of our children, that would be great for us all." She also said if there was any way we could help her show her faculty appreciation this would be a great gift, too. Through the leadership of Becky Hudak several here at FC made a big breakfast on February 26th and brought it over to the principal so she could surprise her faculty with a warm meal before one of their faculty meetings. Our group also helped shortly after this to provide appreciation to the faculty in some other ways.

Then, in early May, Edie and Ian Leet, John Paarlberg, and myself all met with a coordinator at the school and found out how we could begin reading to children. We had to have background checks and each of us were assigned to a teacher and a classroom. Teachers who chose to have reading volunteers were so excited to have our help. I was asked to join a teacher and her students in a pre-K classroom. Each Tuesday I went in and read to 5 groups of 2 children each during a 1 ½ hour session. Teachers unfortunately have little one-on-one time with the kids and felt younger children ages 4 and 5 need lots of extra attention. For 6 Tuesday mornings now I have had the joy of reading stories to approximately 10 different children per session. The kids and I have really enjoyed ourselves and it has been a gift to the teacher, the kids, and me.

School ended the 3rd week of June but this fall we would like again to offer our time to read to the children. If you are interested in joining us, which we hope you will be, please contact John, Sue, Ian, or Edie and we can help get you connected.

PILGRIM'S WALK AT BELTRONE SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER

In April Rev. Sue Vincent-Cox was invited to go and talk to the residents of Beltrone Senior Community Center in Colonie about the ***Spiritual Pilgrimage in the Third Stage of Life***. Approximately 40 residents came to this presentation, one a member of FC who lives at Beltrone. There was great discussion amongst those attending about the joys and struggles of the later years of life.

In the winter of 2013 we offered this same presentation here at FC to members of the Weathervanes. We followed this meeting in the summer with two 7 week small group sessions. Since we found these two gatherings to be quite meaningful at FC Sandy Scudder and Rev. Sue Cox talked with the social worker at Beltrone and wondered if their community would benefit from such a support group. We were enthusiastically invited to come and offer this group. Now in our 5th week, meeting in one of their meeting rooms on the first floor of their community center, Sandy Scudder and Rev. Sue meet with 12 other members of the community for one hour.

The folks in this group have expressed appreciation that this group provides a place where they can talk about the struggle of aging including loss, illness, and isolation. But they also are appreciating that they have a place to explore their spiritual growth and feel empowered by doing this with others. Most members, but not all members of this group, are Christian and are not attending church at this time. Having a place to gather and pray and talk about their faith in God and their walk with Christ has been invaluable. The Consortium of Social Workers in the Capital District who provide services to places like Beltrone have asked if Rev. Sue Vincent Cox would come sometime soon and talk to them about Pilgrim's Walk. Stephanie Wolos, the social worker at Beltrone, has stated on several occasions that she feels this kind of support in small group community, centered around our spiritual relationship to God, is very much needed throughout our communities.

We are planning to offer Pilgrim's Walk to other Senior Citizens Residential Communities again this fall. Special thanks to Sandy Scudder for help in facilitating this group. Her own experience and her wonderful sense of humor have been wonderful assets to the group.


Here at First Church we pray you will find rest this summer, both in fun, leisure and in care and solitude with God.

FALL RETREAT AT CAMP FOWLER, SEPTEMBER 19 - 21

We have reserved the Chi Rho House retreat center at Camp Fowler in Speculator, New York, for the weekend of September 19-21. Chi Rho is a wonderful and newly renovated facility and September is a lovely time of year in the Adirondacks. The retreat is especially geared to families with children but is open to everyone as long as rooms are available. The weekend will include some group activities, times to worship together, and lots of free time for hiking, canoeing, conversation and relaxation.

We are able to offer this retreat at the reduced cost of \$100 per person for the weekend (2 nights lodging and 5 meals). Children up to age 5 are free; children ages 6-13 are ½ price. The Chi Rho House can accommodate about 30 people. STATEMENT ON CASINO GAMBLING

In June, the Capital Area Council of Churches Board of Directors passed a resolution stating the following: "It is the considered opinion of the Board of Directors of the Capital Area Council of Churches that expansion of casino gambling in the Capital Region is not in the best interest of the community." Citing a statement from the General Board of Church and Society of the United Methodist Church, studies about problem gambling, and referencing an article in The Evangelist written by retired Bishop Howard Hubbard as well as a recent Times Union editorial by Rex Smith, the Board concluded that "the presence of casinos benefits those with financial investments in the casinos, but neither the community nor the individuals within it experience benefits."

The General Synod of the Reformed Church in America has issued similar statements concerning gambling, including encouraging regional synods, classes, and RCA congregations to write letters to national, state, and local officials in support of policies that restrict gambling and in opposition to the expansion of gambling.

FROM RCA MISSIONARIES BRUCE AND LAURIE HAWLEY

Dear Friends and Supporters,

It is with a heavy heart that I write this letter.

While we were working in Bastrop, Texas this past January, Laurie's brother, Jesse, was diagnosed with a rare form of pancreatic cancer. Jesse is 63 and lost his wife Lynn to cancer less than two years ago. Laurie left Texas in early February to care for him. When I completed our commitment in Texas in early March, I joined her here at Jesse's Vermont home to help.

Jesse's health has continued to decline. The cancer grew significantly while he was undergoing chemo treatments and he has lost 40 pounds off his slim and athletic 165 pound frame. We feel called to stay here as long as there is a need, and don't know how long that might be. The blessing is that throughout his decline, his faith has been strong and continues to uphold him. He has been surrounded by prayer from family and friends, far and wide. He knows he is in God's hands, and is prepared for whatever comes next.

We contacted Jhonny Alicea-Baez, head of Global Mission and our supervisor, requesting a leave of absence for three months. He has approved our request, meaning we will not be leading work groups this summer. But we know the need for disaster recovery continues, and we know that many of you who have faithfully supported the work with your prayers, money and energy will continue to serve while we serve here.

We have so much appreciation for you, our supporters in mission, all who have and will continue to serve in areas of need all over the globe. It is a mighty God we serve and in giving it is that we receive.

We thank you for your continued prayers as we walk a difficult road with one we love so very much. Jesse feels a sense of peace that only comes from the Lord, that peace that passes our understanding. We praise Him for that.
