FIRST CHURCH TOWERS RENOVATION & PARISH HOUSE ROOF REPLACEMENT TO START IN A FEW WEEKS

CHURCH ROOF REPLACEMENT AND OTHER RESTORATION WORK SCHEDULED FOR 2014-2015

The First Church Board of Trustees voted on April 27 to contract with Turner Construction Company for renovation of the church towers, replacement of the church and parish house roofs and related structural systems, and other building restoration work. After city building permits are obtained, within a few weeks scaffolding will rise around the towers and the parish house for the first phase of a two-year renovation project. In the first construction season (May-November 2014) the landmark towers, designed and constructed in 1796 by Albany architect Philip Hooker, will be repaired and restored to their original appearance. Also in the first year, the 1939 roof on the parish house will be replaced with similar multi-color slates.

In the second season (April-September 2015), scaffolding will be raised on the north and south sides of the church so that the deteriorating copper roof, installed in 1940, can be replaced with new metal roofing. The structurally failing cornice and built-in gutters along the north and south sides of the church will be repaired and restored during this phase. The roof projects are designed to prevent future leakage in the towers, church, and parish house, where water penetration has increased in recent years and caused serious interior damage. Also in the second year, the Pearl Street iron fence, gates, and lampstands will be repaired and restored. The lamps, dark for decades, will be relit with natural gas.

The primary contractor, Turner Construction Company, is a nationwide firm with an office in Albany and a history of successful projects in the Capital Region. Turner has designated Jeffery Lino as project manager and Edward Kaczynski as field superintendent for the First Church building renovation. Both had the same responsibilities in the recently-completed restoration of the interior of Albany's Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Both men have decades of experience in the construction industry. Turner Construction has been the lead contractor for other historic preservation projects in the Capital Region, including the Emma Willard School in Troy and the First Presbyterian Church in Schenectady.

Turner Construction Company will manage and supervise the renovation project and self-perform significant portions of the work. Turner will also supervise twelve sub-contractors performing specialized work, including:

- erecting and dismantling scaffolding
- restoring and reattaching 200-year old wood trim
- removing old paint and refinishing with primer and industrial-quality paint

- installing new lighting on the towers
- repairing and re-gilding the ornamental acorn-shaped ornaments atop the towers
- removing old roofing materials and re-roofing the towers, church, and parish house
- restoring masonry adjacent to the roofs and gutters
- removing and reinstalling lightning protection system (temporary system in interval)
- repairing and restoring cast iron railings
- installing new energy-efficient LED lighting on the towers

Architectural design and oversight for the First Church renovation project are provided by the Albany firm of John G. Waite Associates. The firm has a long roster of historic preservation projects in the Albany area and elsewhere. The project architects are William Brandow and Shannon Brown. Back in 2001 Jack Waite met with a group at First Church to discuss the possibility of renovating the Pearl Street entrance. In 2008 the firm conducted a comprehensive condition assessment of the exterior of the church and parish house. The findings and recommendations in the resulting report prompted the First Church joint boards to approve a capital campaign to help support building renovation as well as enhanced community outreach and mission.

A special concern is protection of First Church's magnificent pipe organ during the two construction seasons. Dust and dirt are unavoidable in any construction project. Delicate organ components will be sealed off during the construction periods, and alternate keyboard instruments will be available. Ian Leet, chairman of the Worship Commission, and Mary Bon, Minister of Music, are leading in this important effort.

Turner Construction Company submitted the lowest of three bids that were solicited by First Church. Their base bid is \$2,027,042. The other two bids were somewhat higher, though the bids were within the expected range. An additional \$82,000 is allowed for lighting of the towers, including the domes which are now lit by the 1970s lighting system. Possible sub-projects are restoration of the iron fencing on the north and south sides of the church and repair and painting of windows and trim on the parish house.

A financing plan has been developed, discussed and approved by the Board of Trustees, and shared with the Joint Boards. The substantial cost of this building restoration project is being supported by the congregation's generous gifts to the Capital Campaign which commenced in 2010; by withdrawals from the church's Special Fund for Replacements (leaving a sufficient balance for other building needs); and by a low-interest (1.67%) loan obtained through Merrill Lynch and secured by the church's general endowment fund.

The financing plan should permit the church to continue withdrawals from the endowment fund at approximately the current rate and amount, supporting a portion of annual budget. Treasurer Ray Van Epps has developed and refined the financing plan, and he has consulted as needed with John Petersen, the church's financial advisor, affiliated with Merrill Lynch. The Classis of Albany will need to approve the building loan, and the required information has been provided to that body.

The Board of Trustees and the Renovation Committee extend their thanks to the Consistory of First Church and to the congregation and friends for their generous support of the building renovation project and for their ongoing interest. Yet as much as we admire and invest in our historic structure, our church home, we also remember that of our spiritual home *“Jesus Christ himself is the cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God”* (Ephesians 2:20-22).

Children and Worship

Every Sunday at First Church, right after our children's sermon, our younger children (ages 4-7) join our Children and Worship Greeter and quietly go up to their own worship center. Before they enter the Children and Worship Center each child puts a sticker by their name to show their attendance. Then the greeter quietly shows the children the title of the story they will hear. These titles are always visible for them on the bulletin board.

The kids enjoy putting this sticker next to their name each week because it is a quiet activity that gives the children time to begin to slow down and prepare to enter their worship. Entering their worship center is just like entering the larger church sanctuary. All enter silently and prepare themselves to be attentive so that we may hear the Word of God.

This is the second year of Children & Worship here at First Church. Each week between 3-5 children attend and each week we see their growing awareness of God's presence in their daily experience. We also continue to see growing friendships among the children as they worship together week after week.

In the picture here you see some of the children creatively expressing themselves after hearing one of the biblical stories. They use various mediums such as painting, drawing, collage, and more. Our Stories for May will be: 4th Ascension; 11th Pentecost; 18th Baptism.

BREAKING NEWS FROM KIBERA

The Sosep school in Kibera, Kenya is being demolished. *May update: The Kibera Committee is developing a recommended response from First Church to this situation.*

We need to remember that Raphael and everyone else in Kibera are squatters. They do not own the land that they are on. In years gone by, the army has actually been called in, and battles have erupted between Kibera residents and the government. Raphael is now looking for property that he can buy for the school, and therefore own the land.

Hi Steve my friend, i know you are still in Jerusalem but i just want to let you know what is going on here.

Our Sosep Nursey school is faced with two big challenges which will affect the school seriously.

1. The Kenya Railways is constructing two lines in their old railway line passing through Kibera slums, our school is a few meters away from the railway line, and because of the expansion which is going on now several houses, schools, churches, businesses and projects are going to be affected, Sosep school is one of them, our school has been marked to be pulled down like others. The construction of the railway has just started in the upper side of Kibera, maybe it will reach our school in the next 3 months.

2. The second challenge is the upgrading of the Maram road which passes near our school, this one too has put mark on school and the old iron sheet building which we were using before we build our blue class rooms.

I strongly feel that i should tell you before i tell anybody else this BIG problem we are faced with here as a school. Attached are photos of the construction work going on at the Kibera railways and photos of marked classrooms and the old building. Totaly sad news but many people are affected some houses have been pulled down. Raphael
