## From the Pastor

Dear Friends,

Later this month at our congregational meeting on May 17 we will elect elders, deacons and trustees. As it happens, one of the lectionary texts for that Sunday is a story about how the early church chose its leaders. The story is in the first chapter of Acts and takes place after Jesus ascension and as his followers are waiting in Jerusalem for the promise of the Holy Spirit.

With Judas' demise, the disciples were down to eleven. *Twelve* is a number with biblical and theological significance. So it seemed good and proper to get the disciples back to "twelve." There was a position to fill.

Peter makes this proposal: *"One of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection."* So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, *"Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place."* And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles. (Acts 1: 21-26)

There are several things to note here:

- The fundamental qualification for leadership: Someone who had been with Jesus. They did not seek out someone who was an eloquent speaker or gifted administrator. The only thing that mattered on the candidates' resumes was whether they had been with Jesus. Leaders in the church must first and foremost be people who know Jesus.
- The task: to be a witness to the resurrection. Elders, deacons and trustees have their specific responsibilities. Elders are called to a ministry of spiritual care and nurture; deacons are called to lead the congregation in ministries of mercy, justice and outreach, with a particular concern for those in need or distress; trustees are called to care for the physical and financial assets of the congregation. But above all their task, like that of all followers of Jesus, is to witness to the resurrection. In their words and deeds they are to bear witness to the love and power of the living Christ.
- The process: They prayed and cast lots. They acted in the faith that God was involved in the selection process. Prayer is essential. They served as a kind of nominating committee, but God made the final choice. We also believe that the selection of elders and deacons is not merely a human choice, but a God-guided decision. At their ordination elders and deacons are asked: "Do you believe in your heart that you are called by Christ's church, and therefore by God, to this office?"
- The result: Matthias is chosen and we never hear of him again. This is the only mention of Matthias in the whole of the New Testament. Being a leader does not necessarily mean being in the limelight. Not all leadership is charismatic. People who are quietly faithful can also be effective leaders.

- And finally, while we believe the Holy Spirit works *through* the constituted assemblies and official actions of the church, the Spirit is not *confined* by the church. The church chose Matthias as the 12<sup>th</sup> apostle, but just a few more chapters into the Book of Acts and Paul becomes the dominant figure. The Apostle Paul, who was not one of “The Twelve” becomes the leading missionary to the Gentiles. Not all leaders are ‘official leaders.’ God can raise up leaders beyond and outside the official structures of the church. You may not be chosen to serve as an elder, deacon or trustee, but that doesn’t necessarily mean that you are not being called to lead. God may be calling you to lead in other ways.

I hope we can keep these thoughts in mind as we go about the process of choosing leaders in our congregation. Above all to remember that the most important responsibility for the congregation in this process is to pray.

## **Drive-In & FOCUS Worship Services**

Drive-in worship services begin Sunday, May 3, and will be held each Sunday at 9:00 am through September 6 with the exception of the last Sunday in June (June 28) when we will worship at 10 am in Clee Park. The Lord's Supper will be celebrated the first Sunday of each month. Drive-In Worship services are enhanced by special music and we depend on the generosity of guest musicians to supply music for our services. We gather in the Sheridan Avenue parking lot and in Clee Park for a half-hour worship service led from the outdoor pulpit.

The FOCUS congregations will worship together at 9:30 am the first Sunday of July (First Presbyterian Church), August (Emmanuel Baptist Church) and September (Trinity United Methodist Church). There will not be a worship service in the First Church sanctuary on those Sundays. Drive-in worship will be held each Sunday at 9 am through the summer.

# **BUILDING RENOVATION REPORT – MAY 2015**

First Church is entering the second season of its major building renovation project. The renovation committee offers to the congregation this report on work completed in 2014 and planned for 2015. The new parish house roof was the major accomplishment of 2014. The old slate roof replaced with new slates and a new rubber membrane underneath to shed water. Asbestos was discovered and abated, the insecure main chimney was rebuilt. Metal dormer windows and new gutters and down spouts completed the work.

The 110-foot towers are an iconic feature of First Church. The scaffolding has permitted close-up inspection of exterior conditions and removal of the sixteen columns. Over the winter craftsmen rebuilt the columns and capitals, and one of the completed columns is now installed temporarily in the Sheridan Avenue lobby. The oval windows have been removed and are being refurbished. Work on the towers this season will be extensive repairs to woodwork, and scraping, stripping, priming, and painting. The original metal dome roofs, possibly the earliest in the U.S., are being preserved and covered with stainless steel. Inside the towers, the floors now have a new membrane roof, and cabling will increase structural stability. Ian Leet has obtained proposals for reactivating the four tower clocks.

The final phase of the project is replacing the church's copper roof and repairing the built-in gutter system along the north and south sides. Scaffolding began to be erected along the south wall on April 13. The roof will be replaced with new copper sheets with standing-seam covered joints. The eaves, soffits, and gutters will be rebuilt, then scraped, primed, and painted.

The renovation committee, the Board of Trustees, and the Joint Boards have determined to get these big jobs—the roofs, the towers—done now and done well, because conditions would only worsen and costs would only increase. But we have never lost sight of the fact that our church home, however beautiful and historic, is a house of prayer and worship, of song and praise, of mission and service.

## **Pilgrim's Walk Small Group Ministry**

On Tuesday April 22<sup>nd</sup> we started our 5<sup>th</sup> Pilgrim's Walk Group. This group is at Sheehy Manor in Watervliet per the request of one of our First Church members. Twenty residents signed up and we were delighted to hear from 3 of these residents that they had heard good feedback in their community about Pilgrim's Walk.

In the Pilgrim's Walk group we meet one hour, one time per week, for 7 weeks and share the experiences of the third stage of life. These experiences include the fears and triumphs of aging: the desire for purpose, the struggle of loss, gratitude, end of life concerns, and the need for support and care from one another in community. Central to all of this is our relationship with God. Our connection to the sacred is the rock we stand on.

Stephanie Wolos, the social worker at Beltrone Living Center in Colonie says,  
*"We are very pleased to have the Pilgrim's Walk program at Beltrone. Our residents have praised the 7 week program, emphasizing the uplifting message, the opportunity for mutual support, and the blossoming of new friendships. Pilgrim's Walk has filled an important need for our residents in the form of personal guidance on how to find joy and hope while coping with the challenges that come with age. I am not aware of another program like it."*

Stephanie has been instrumental in helping us bring Pilgrim's Walk to the Senior Citizens at Beltrone. Sandy Scudder, a member here at First Church, also has been instrumental as she has been a co-leader with Pastor Sue Cox and participants say they very much enjoy her honest sharing and wonderful humor.

Rev. Susan Vincent Cox has been asked to be the keynote speaker at the **Senior Issues Forum in Albany on July 22<sup>nd</sup>**. She will be talking about the significance of Pilgrim's Walk with its central focus on spiritual community and support.
