Send your Holy Spirit to enable us to exude gratitude in radical ways, understanding that true gratitude flows from seriously grasping the grace you have shown us in Jesus Christ. Amen.

Friends, Karl Barth also says, "Gratitude follows grace like thunder follows lightning," and in our sermon text today, Paul prays for the the Christians of Ephesus:

"I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

May we, too, come to comprehend God's grace to us in Jesus Christ so we might live a thunderously grateful life.





Few Welsh hymns are as well known or loved as this 18th-century text that did not gain its popular tune until the early 20th century. In both its original text and in English translation, it is a stirring hymn of pilgrimage filled with vivid imagery from Hebrew Scripture.



Although this hymn is often used on large and festive occasions, its first two stanzas had much humbler beginnings: they originated as a family table prayer during the Thirty Years' War (1618–1648). These words have been associated with this tune since the mid-17th century.
